#### Year 3-4 Camp

I recently had the pleasure of attending the Year 3-4s camp to 15 Mile Creek, alongside their teachers Lauren Crombie, Sean Gales and Nicola Robertson, and our volunteers Lisa Donaldson, Katrina Colvin and Charli Williams who we thank for their time and involvement. As staff we were extremely proud of every student - for many this being the first time they had stayed away from home, and first time sleeping a night in a tent in the bush. Alongside the environmental focus of this camp, were the aims of building responsibility and care for self and others, teamwork, resilience, empathy and the courage to step out of one's comfort zone. It is always such a pleasure to see the personal reward and feeling of success and satisfaction when students achieve something that they thought they couldn't do. When they overcome their fears, when they build a stronger sense of self and empathy for others and discover new things about their peers that they never knew. It's all these things that make providing these extra curricula opportunities so important and something that we are committed to continuing year after year.

#### **Grounds Works**

We have recently has some works completed in the grounds of the school. Each year we seek a voluntary grounds contribution of \$25 per family that is targeted at works within the grounds to benefit all members of our school community, especially our students. We have recently had new post pads installed on the posts along the undercover walkway at a cost of \$11,700 and new shade sails installed in the top area next to the Cooking Centre, over the shops, and above the playground equipment the height of the sails extended and repairs completed on sails. The cost of the shade sail works being \$15,400. Our thanks to our Parents and Friends Group who contributed \$4,000 toward the post pads.

Every event or fundraising activity run by the P&F that is supported by our families and wider community assists in enabling such contributions. In action at the moment is the extension of the nature playground area behind the BER, and some money raised by the Student Leadership Team is going toward things within this that the students have indicated they would like. I would encourage any families thinking about making the voluntary grounds contribution to consider doing so, as we continue to work on projects and ways of improving our grounds.



# Free Health, Wellbeing and Development Checks for Prep Students

Dear Foundation Parents/Carers,

The Primary School Nursing Program is a free service offered by the Department of Education to all prep/foundation students and their families during their child's first year of school.

The program aims to assist in the early identification of children with potential health, wellbeing or development concerns which may impact on their education and offers screening (such as hearing, vision, speech, dental and motor skills) as well as advice, information and referrals to other health and support services.

Parents / carers can support their child's participation in the program by completing an online School Entrant Health Questionnaire.

You can access and complete the online questionnaire on a mobile phone, computer or tablet. A paper version of the questionnaire is available from your child's school if you prefer.

Once the questionnaire has been submitted, the Primary School Nurse will visit your child's school to conduct further health screenings for students that require it. The nurse may contact you to further discuss any concerns raised in the questionnaire, using the details you provided.

Soon, information about the Primary School Nursing Program, including how to access and complete the School Entrant Health Questionnaire, will be sent home. Participation in the program is not mandatory and parent/carer consent is required for the Primary School Nurse to see your child. If you do not wish to participate, you are encouraged to register and select 'No I do not consent' in the online questionnaire so that your response is recorded.
