#### A Flying Start to Term 3!

Term 3 has got off to a busy start with the first 2 weeks flying by. We've had some of our Year 6s partake in a leadership camp during the first week, a wonderful French Celebration Day, printing t-shirts ready for the RPS Mini Olympics, visits to Glenview, and the Student Leadership Team organising timber teepees delivered by the Men's Shed. All of this wrapped up in lots of great learning in and out of the classroom. We have had large numbers of student absence over these first 2 weeks, and are looking forward to students feeling better and returning to school.

In Week 4, we will be holding our, 'RPS Student-Led Showcase'. These student-led conferences involve your child leading you through their journey thus far and sharing with you the things they are proud of, have progressed in, and what they are working on moving forward. Your child's teacher will be on hand to chat to you, though families who would like extra time to speak with their child's teacher will need to make a further time to meet. Our students have been busily preparing for these conferences and what they wish to share with you. We invite all families (can be parents, grandparents, other relatives, older siblings or special friend) to commit a small amount of time to come along and be a part of your child's schooling. Toward the end of Term 2 students across Year 4-6 completed the annual Attitudes to School Survey. Before completing the survey I talk with the students about the importance of completing the survey and why as a school we value their feedback. I explain how we use their feedback to acknowledge the great progress that has been made across certain areas, in particular factors around behaviour and bullying since we introduced School-Wide Positive Behaviour 4 years ago. We also use this information to better understand the areas we need to work on, or find out more from students about ways we can improve certain areas. Please see some of these results on p.2, along with the areas we have identified we need to further collaborate with, and listen to students in order to improve. Coming out this week via Compass will be details for the Parent Opinion Survey. Just like our students, your feedback is important to us and again helps to acknowledge the things that are going well, and the areas that together we can continue to improve.

The NAPLAN student reports for Years 3 and 5 have been provided to schools and will be sent home with your child on Tuesday 30th July. Please look out for this report.


