Welcome back to Term 2!

It's been a busy first weeks of Term 2 and already it's hard to believe that week 3 is almost over. The 5-6s enjoyed their camp to Beechworth last week, learning a great deal about the history of gold, Ned Kelly and our local area. The Year 3-4s are heading off next week to 15 Mile Creek for 4 days with an environmental focus to the camp. These extra curricula opportunities are not only fantastic for learning, but building resilience, confidence, team work, independence and problem solving to name but many advantages. We are fortunate to offer such opportunities to our students and thank our families for supporting attendance at these.

4-year School Review at RPS - a parent's perspective!

I recently sat in on the School Review at Rutherglen Primary School. This is something that happens in all schools every four years. The purpose of the school review is to see how the school has performed against the goals they set themselves four years ago, and to get useful feedback from an outsider's perspective about how the school is operating. Four people from the Department of Education visited the school over three days and met with school staff and the School Council President (that's me!) They observed classroom teaching, talked to staff members, to groups of students, and to groups of parents. Some of you came along to the parent groups that were advertised – my thanks to you for making the time to come along and contribute.

Overall, the review panel was very impressed with what they saw at RPS, and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. The school received the highest ranking for one of the core elements in the review, and the second-highest ranking for the remaining four core elements. The reviewer also noted how much work our Principal, Karryn Williams, had put into the pre-review self-assessment, and commented that it was one of the best prepared that they had seen!

Some of the areas our school can feel proud of include: strong results in numeracy, writing, and classroom behaviour when compared to similar schools and the state average; spacious playgrounds; a range of optional activities such as chess and sport; the cooking and gardening program; engagement with the local community (ANZAC Day, visits to Glenview and the Kinder, participation in Rutherglen Agricultural Show); specialist teachers for PE, Art, STEM and French; and the School Production held every two years.


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On the final day of the review, the review panel set the goals for the coming 4-year period in the key areas of Learning and Wellbeing – it's quite a lot of work!

Being part of the review process reinforced my view that I am lucky to have had my children attend Rutherglen Primary School. I believe that the staff are one of our strengths at RPS - from what I have seen, they go above and beyond what is required of them as teachers, and their dedication to their students makes such a difference in improving student outcomes and wellbeing.

One final area that was mentioned in the review was how good the food was! Students from the school cooked and served the morning teas and lunches for the review panel members on all three days. The quality of the food and the pride shown when the students served it was wonderful to see. It was a great reminder of how lucky we are to have a cooking and gardening program at RPS.






Across the school, the following STEM topics are being covered in Term 2:
