

# Unit Are We Learning in Foundation?

#### **Reading & Writing**

In Reading, students will learn to share their thinking about modelled texts and learn a number of comprehension strategies such as making predictions before and during reading and making text-to-self and text-to-text connections. Students will also participate in weekly small-group guided reading sessions to support them to decode texts independently.

In Writing, students will be introduced to the Writing Process with a focus on developing ideas, planning our writing and adding detail through pictures and words. We will begin to re-create familiar texts and publish these for our classroom libraries.

In Maths this term, students will develop their knowledge and skills in the topics of whole number, addition/subtraction, shape, time and money through targeted sessions/activities using concrete materials and openended problem-solving questioning.

#### **ICT & Wellbeing**

In Digital Technologies this term, students will spend time learning how to correctly care for our laptops and iPads when they are in use, as well as, learning the correct way to store them.

In addition to embedding our understanding of the school values, our weekly Wellbeing sessions will see our Foundies focus on developing their social skills: sharing and compromising with their classroom peers, as well as recognising and responding to the feelings of others. READING & WRITING

WHAT THE 1-25 AL

ARNING IN TERM

At the beginning of term, the 1-2's will spend time building the Reading Community which involves understanding our daily one hour Reading Workshop and creating classroom libraries. Students decide which books they wish to have in the library, sort all their chosen books into categories and get creative by making display tags for each section. Students will consolidate their understanding of their inner conversation (little voice in their head that talks to them as they read) and track this as they read texts both with the class and independently. We will the go on to explore the strategy of predicting and how we can use clues to predict what a text may be about and what events might happen next. We will look to deepen our thinking as we make predictions by using text clues to support our thinking.

# MATHS

Developing our counting and place value skills are the area of focus at the start of term. Skip counting patterns of 2, 3, 5 and 10 will be consolidated starting from zero and other starting points. In the area of place value, key skills including reading and writing numbers, ordering and comparing (more/less) up to and beyond 1000 will be consolidated through hands on activities and problems. Later in the term, addition and subtraction will also be introduced to give students opportunity to apply their number knowledge and see how many areas of maths are inter-



# INTEGRATED

We are excited to be travelling back into the past as part of our History topic this term. Learning about the past and present and exploring the changes over time to school, home life, transport and technology will be our areas of focus. We hope to incorporate visits to Glenview to share our learning with the residents, have grandparents and community members share their memories and artefacts from times gone by and hopefully celebrate a great term of learning with a visit to the Jindera Pioneer Museum. Understanding the Writing Process and the parts within this is the starting point for Writing this term. Students will work through each stage of the process, but rather than writing they will create a clay-based model. This activity helps students consolidate their understandings of pre-writing (coming up with an idea),

drafting, revising, editing and publishing. Narrowing down ideas for our writing will be our first writing piece of the term. Students will use the 'funnelling' technique to select one idea and develop specific details about it and then write these details into complete sentences.

Procedural writing will be the focus in the second half of term providing students with an opportunity to write informative texts that teach people how to do something.

# WHAT ARE WE LEARNING IN THE 3/4 UNIT ?

#### <u>Reading</u>

In reading this term we have been setting up our Reading Workshop and routines.

Our next steps are to work on identifying the plot and theme of narrative texts. Finally, we will be analysing author's craft and the way authors construct texts.

#### <u>Writing</u>

In writing this term we have been setting up our Writing Workshop and expectations.

Our first genre for writing will be short narratives, focussing on narrowing down a big idea. We will also be doing a unit on procedural texts.

#### <u>Maths</u>

In maths, we have started off by collecting and representing data about our class and unit, and interpreting and discussing this data. This term we will also be covering Place Value and some other topics in number, and will be really looking to make connections between different areas of mathematics!

#### **Cooking**

Mrs Miller will be teaching cooking this term, covering lots of curriculum content in the kitchen!

#### <u>Gardening</u>

Mr Gales will be teaching gardening this term, discussing how to be safe in the garden, weeding and harvesting.

#### **Integrated**

Mrs Robertson will be teaching Integrated this term, students will be learning about rules and laws and the government.

#### <u>Wellbeing</u>

For wellbeing, we will be focussing on understanding our school values, our brains, and working on our Growth Mindsets!

#### <u>ICT</u>

In ICT, after establishing rules and expectations, we will be creating and following simple algorithms and visual programs.

# 5-6 TERM 1 LEARNING & NEWS

Our 5-6 students have made a fantastic return to school in 2024. They have been excited to learn, and are already showing great leadership skills, particularly our Year 6 students with their Foundation Buddies.

### **Reading & Writing**

We have been recapping our Reader's and Writer's Workshop models, revisiting the roles of the students and teachers during these times. Our students have also been very active in setting up our class libraries - creating wishlists, sourcing texts and organising these appropriately. Students also enjoyed creating pencil holders out of clay, as a way of reviewing the writing process, noting when they were pre-writing, drafting, revising, editing and publishing. We will soon be exploring narrative structures in reading, and applying

these to our own writing to engage readers, focusing on the inclusion of important details and using appropriate pacing to keep our audience engaged.

# Discovery & ICT

space

Our students have been active contributors, and have particularly enjoyed brainstorming and developing classroom expectations and learning environments. This has been quite valuable, as it has allowed students to take a sense of pride and ownership of their new classrooms, whilst staying accountable

for their own actions. Links were also made to this in ICT, where students have been looking at ways in which they can be safe online, and promote

healthy use of technology. Later in the term, we will be investigating how groups of people work together to achieve a common goal, and looking at how this can link to our own classroom/personal strengths. Following this, we will be exploring issues related to citizenship in Australia, including who can be a citizen, and the different experiences and contributions citizens bring.

A touch base on our home learning expectations, as we know this can be an unclear area for some students. Students are required to be doing some home learning nightly. This can take the form of reading (independently or with an adult/older sibling), writing, engaging with texts online via Epic, completing unfinished school tasks, or completing some Essential Assessment Tasks (such as My Numeracy, Jetpack Algebra, or My Spelling). We understand that families are busy during the week, and students have many outside commitments, however we strongly encourage all students to spend 15-20 minutes a night completing some home learning. This is also great preparation for high school.



#### Maths

So far in maths, we have been applying our measurement knowledge and skills when finding the foot size and height of students in our unit. Through this learning, students explored measuring and representing heights using appropriate units of measurement, and converting between millimeters, centimeters and meters. We also represented our data using a range of displays, and investigated appropriate ways of analysing data, including calculating the mean, median, mode and range. We will soon be moving on and investigating place value, exploring decimals, and making links back to our learning about measurement.

#### Appendix A

#### Fact sheet 1: school council elections – information for parents

#### What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the broad direction of a school, in accordance with Ministerial Order 1280 Constitution of Government School Councils, and the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006*. In doing this, a school council may directly influence the quality of education for students.

#### Who is on the school council?

For most primary school councils, there are several possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected parent member category more than one-third of the total members must be from this category according to Ministerial Order 1280. Department employees can be parent members at their child's school providing that they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected school employee member category members of this category make up no more than one-third of membership. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional community member category members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experience. Department employees are not eligible to be community members.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

#### Why is parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills and a range of experiences and knowledge that can help inform and shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

#### Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable skills and knowledge to the role, however, in order to successfully perform their duties, councillors may need to gain some new skills and knowledge.

It is important to have an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

#### Code of conduct for school councillors

School councils in Victoria are public entities as defined by the Public Administration Act 2004.

School councillors must comply with the Code of Conduct for Directors of Victorian Public Entities issued by the Victorian Public Sector Commission. The Code of Conduct is based on the Victorian public sector values and requires councillors to:

• act with honesty and integrity – be truthful, open and clear about their motives and declare any real, potential or perceived conflict of interest and duty

- act in good faith in the best interests of the school work cooperatively with other councillors and the school community, be reasonable, and make all decisions with the best interests of students foremost in their minds
- act fairly and impartially consider all relevant facts of an issue before making a decision, seek to have a balanced view, never give special treatment to a person or group and never act from self-interest
- use information appropriately respect confidentiality and use information for the purpose for which it was made available
- exercise due care, diligence and skill accept responsibility for decisions and do what is best for the school
- use the position appropriately not use the position as a councillor to gain an advantage
- act in a financially responsible manner observe all the above principles when making financial decisions
- **comply with relevant legislation and policies** know what legislation and policies are relevant for which decisions and obey the law
- **demonstrate leadership and** stewardship set a good example, encourage a culture of accountability, manage risks effectively, exercise care and responsibility to keep the school strong and sustainable.

#### Indemnity for school council members

School councillors are indemnified against any liability in respect of any loss or damage suffered by the council or any other person in respect of anything necessarily or reasonably done, or omitted to be done by the councillor in good faith in:

- a. the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a councillor, or
- the reasonable belief that the act or omission was in the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a council.

#### How can you become involved?

By participating in, and voting in the school council elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might consider:

standing for election as a member of the school council

encouraging another person to stand for election.

#### What do you need to do to stand for election?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for nominations in Term 1 of each year. Council elections must be completed by 31 March, unless varied by the Minister for Education.

If you stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or, you can nominate yourself in the parent member category. You can only be nominated by another member of the same electorate that you are eligible for (e.g. a member of the parent electorate may only nominate another parent of that electorate)

Department employees with a child enrolled at a school where they are not engaged in work, are eligible to nominate for parent membership at that school.

Return your completed nomination form to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt via post, email or by hand delivery.

Generally, if there are more nominations than vacancies a ballot will be conducted in the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

#### Remember

Consider standing for election to school council.

Ask the principal for instructions if you are not sure what to do.

Be sure to vote if the election goes to ballot.

Contact the principal if you are unsure about what is required at any stage of the election process.
